William writes a friend in the United States:

"SEPT. 7, 1944

Today I received your letter, and I was certainly glad to hear from you...

...I guess by now you have heard about my misfortune. I went into operations as soon as I returned from the states and I had n't flown but a few missions until they got me. I was wounded about a month ago and have been in the hospital ever since. I was n't hurt too serious, but it will be some time before I have normal vision out of my left eye. No noticable scars or any thing like that of course I'm not allowed to give you the full details as yet. My combat flying career is over with. I expect to be sent else where for further treatment – that sounds very good to me – so heres hoping we'll see you all soon.
