Milton's friend sends him a letter from the United States:

"2/28/43

How are you? Well I trust and hope. I have not received an answer to the letter I wrote you Jan. 25 but I understand. Because no doubt it either was lost or your answer was or you might even be kept too busy now to write. I'm very busy myself these days so I know how it is. Please write me first chance you get & let me know if you receive V-MAIL in its correct form where you are.

Last Mon. nite I went Bowling and had oodles of fun. I won't disclose my score however because you see this was my first try.

Fri nite I went to the Y. M. C. A. – U. S O. to make recordings. That business was very dull. But I was kept busy sewing buttons & a division sign on for a Captain who is living at the Y. M.

Tomorrow nite I am going to my first official fight at the Arena...Daddy says I should take along some smelling salts. Will write & tell you all about it...

...Well it is getting late & space is scarce here so I must close now, but remember to take good care of yourself, Wishing You the Best of Luck I

Remain Sincerely Your friend

Sally..."

Milton's friend's letter above is returned to sender with the outside marked "IT IS REGRETTED THIS ITEM COULD NOT BE DELIVERED AS ADDRESSEE HAS BEEN REPORTED..." and further marked "Status Changed to: Prisoner of War."

Milton writes the same friend in the United States from a German Prisoner of War Camp:

"April 9 – 1944

Received your swell letter and the pictures! I'm so glad you correspond with my brother. The picture he sent you was taken during a dinner invitation...But the one invitation that I want to keep is yours – remember? So sorry to hear of your recent illness...How was the trip...I'd like to hear more about it. I only wish I could've been there to help show you around – it is a beautiful place. Your pictures are great – hope they're not rationed. We had an Easter service which was very touching. God grant us the next one at home...

Just me, Milton"
